Dear Sir/Madam.Parish Councillors.

I am working with a team who is representing Lyth and Winster catchment farmers. On their behalf we are applying in May for a Landscape Recovery Environmental Land Management scheme. These are the new agricultural schemes replacing the ones which existed under the EU. We started planning in November 2021 and began engaging in August 2022. We have had high level DEFRA ministers in the valley in Dec and April. Farmers from the catchment have contributed to engineers reports looking at the water management and drainage systems. We have over 40 farmers involved and 1,300 hectares already which far exceeds the minimum requirement to apply.

If accepted , the scheme will optimize production,improve biodiversity through habitat creation,improve water quality,reduce flood impacts,develop a net carbon sustainable agricultural economy and deliver societal benefit to rural communities. We are looking for acknowledgement from local parish councils to enable us to try to deliver the targets. Any support would be appreciated and as we develop , numerous opportunities will evolve. This is led by local farmers for local communities. 22 schemes were accepted in 2022 and we are bidding to Government to be 1 of 25 this year.
